

Summary of Evidence in the case of Denis
Tracey of Ballyhorgan, Co. Kerry, charged
with having a gun without a permit.

Constable James Regan, R.I.C., stationed
at Ballyduff, Co. Kerry, states : -

On the 20th March 1919, at about 8.30 a.m.
I entered the house of Denis Tracey with
a view of searching for arms. There were
two other constables with me, but they
remained outside the door. I met his wife
in the kitchen, and asked her certain
questions. Being dissatisfied with her
replies, I entered the room off the kitchen
where Tracey was in bed. I asked him had
he a gun or ammunition in the house.
He said he had no gun or ammunition. I then
informed him that I had come to search his
house, to which he offered no objection.

On the top of a press in the room in which he
was sleeping, I found a single barrel shot
gun, and seven live cartridges with three
spent ones. I asked him to account for the
possession of them. He replied that he had
the cartridges in his possession for over 12
months, and had the gun for the purpose of
shooting crows.

The gun was in two pieces: it was rusty, and
only fit for shooting crows. The fore end or
piece which fits on under the barrel, was missing.

Accused declines to
cross-examine.

Seizure of a gun and ammunition

Tralee, 23rd day of March 1879

This man is suspected to be one of a gang who raided Beally house last night and fired through windows very nearly shooting the constables.

When I learned that the police had found gun and ammunition in house I directed the arrest of the man. I strongly advise that this man be forthwith tried by court martial, and that he be conveyed to Cork tomorrow. If my suggestion is approved I request that the Dr. Lieutenant (18 on telephone) be informed at once.

Seizure of a gun and ammunition

I beg to report that while on duty on this date making inquiries re the shooting into Ballyhorgan House on night of 19th Inst.

I entered the house of Denis Tracey of Ballyhorgan. I met his wife in the Kitchen. I asked her if her husband was in. She replied that he was in bed. I asked her if there was a gun in the house & she replied that they had no gun. I began then to search the house, and on entering the room where Tracey was in bed, I spoke with him and asked him if he had a gun he denied it. I told him that I would search his house, to this he did not reply. On searching the top of a press in the bed room I found a single barrel shot gun, and ~~six~~^{seven} live cartridges and two spent ones. I took possession of them and I asked Tracey to account for them, he stated that they were in the house for over 12 months, and that the gun was only used for shooting crows.
